Many good dairy farmers have found the best way to get replacements for the dairy herd is to raise them yourself. If you buy surplus stock from another herd owner, you might be getting some animals that are lower in production than the rest. Mr. Naylor is shown in the picture with some of his herd which includes the six mature cows he is milking at present. The Naylors won't have to wait very long now until they will be in the milk production business in a substantial way.

There's a lot less chance your dairy herd will suffer mastitis if you dip teats in an antiseptic solution right after milking. You'll want to see that stalls are well bedded, to, and make sure lanes and barnyard are well drained.
